DINNER MEETING – Dr. Jonathan L. Meakins WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 19, from 6:00 pm Modern Hospitals and the Healing Environment



The McGill Reporter called Dr. Jonathan Meakins "one of the most distinguished surgical leaders in the history of McGill's Faculty of Medicine." A member of a notable Montreal medical family, he followed in the footsteps of his father and grandfather, who both held key appointments at the Royal Victoria Hospital and who dedicated their careers to transforming and improving health care. Dr. Meakins now retired distinguished McGill professor — has served

as surgeon-in-chief at the Royal Victoria Hospital, chair of the McGill Department of Surgery, surgeon-in-chief of the MUHC, and from 2002 to 2008, Nuffield Professor of Surgery at Oxford University. He is currently the Director of the MUHC Heritage Centre. His illustrated talk will address the principles surrounding the creation of a healing environment, with specific focus on the history and evolution of surgical techniques at the Royal Victoria Hospital of Montreal.

Dr. Meakins' talk is sure to stir memories among our members who both served at the Vic in various professional capacities and visited the Vic as patients. Dr. Meakins' talk will remind us of how far we have come, and how far we still need to go, in providing a healing environment.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 16, from 6:00 pm Dr. Rhoda E. Howard-Hassmann, F.R.S.C. State Food Crimes

Dr. Howard-Hassmann's latest book, State Food Crimes, is about states that deny their own citizens and others for whom they are directly responsible one of their most fundamental human rights: the right to food. Recently retired from teaching after 13 years as Canada Research Chair in International Human Rights at Wilfrid Laurier



University, jointly appointed to the Department of Political Science and the School of International Policy and Governance at the Balsillie School of International Affairs, Dr. Howard-Hassmann is the author of many books on issues of human rights and is currently at work on a new one entitled In Defense of Universal Human Rights.

RESOLUTIONS ETC...

This is a monthly update about the status of resolutions at CFUW and its sister clubs in order to keep members informed about the dynamics and outcomes of the resolution process.

What are resolutions?

They are issues of concern that are identified and investigated in order to take a position that will positively influence the conditions of women and girls in a given context. The topics can stem from local, national or international domains and conform to CFUW's mission and interest.

Resolutions are often proposed by CFUW clubs. They are reviewed nationally by all sister clubs before being amended and proposed for adoption but are not necessarily adopted. This is only done by a vote at the CFUW national AGM.

Resolutions and policy

Adopted resolutions are translated into policies that serve as catalysts to fuel advocacy and actions. The CFUW–FCFDU Policy Book 1964-2015 (available at cfuwadmin.org) is structured around 10 concepts articulated in 47 policy domains: Aboriginal (1), Children (1), Safety (3), Culture (3), Social Problems (4), International (4), Education (7), Environment (8), Health (7), and Laws and Regulations (9). Several policies are assigned to each domain. This 280-page book includes all resolutions that were adopted by CFUW, including the UWCM Resolution on Women's Financial Literacy. During the June 2016 AGM in St. Catharines, five resolutions were adopted:

1. Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls – Ending the Marginalization of Indigenous Women in Canadian Society, *proposed by CFUW Barrie and District.*

2. Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) – Diagnosis, Intervention and Support Plan for Children, Adults and Families Affected by FASD, *proposed by CFUW Guelph and CFUW Kitchener-Waterloo*.

3. Strengthen the Pest Management Regulatory Agency in Order to Protect the Environment, *proposed by CFUW Owen Sound and Area*.

4. Electoral Reform: Adding Proportionality to the Electoral System in Canada, *proposed by CFUW Leaside-East York and CFUW Etobicoke*.

5. Sustainable Development Goals Also Known as Global Goals, proposed by CFUW Standing Committee on Advocacy, CFUW Standing Committee on International Relations, CFUW Standing Committee on Education.



Clubs that plan to submit a resolution must follow a certain process that I will outline in the next newsletter.
