### WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 16, from 6:00 pm Rhoda E. Howard-Hassmann, Ph.D., FRSC *State Food Crimes*

Dr. Howard-Hassmann's latest book, *State Food Crimes,* is about states that deny their own citizens (and others for whom they are directly responsible) one of their most fundamental human rights: the right to food.

Recently retired from teaching after 13 years as Canada Research Chair in International Human Rights at Wilfrid Laurier University in Waterloo, jointly appointed to the Department of Political Science and the School of International Policy and Governance at the Balsillie School of International Affairs, Dr. Howard-Hassmann is the author of many books on issues of human rights.

Dr. Howard-Hassmann holds a Ph.D. in Sociology from McGill University and was named the first Distinguished Scholar of Human Rights by the American Political Science Association. She was also named a distinguished Scholar of Human Rights and was awarded the Sir John William Dawson Medal for interdisciplinary research. She has published numerous articles and book chapters on human rights and development, women's rights, GLBT rights, the Canadian foreign and refugee policy, and sociological issues in international and Canadian human rights. She is currently working on a book to be entitled *In Defense of Universal Human Rights*, has been on the editorial boards of many journals, and maintains a blog entitled "Rights&Rightlessness" at <u>http://</u> <u>rhodahassmann.blogspot.com</u>.

### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

#### Dear members,

The months are flying by and the board is keeping busy trying to increase our club's membership and involvement in our community. We have a lot of work on our plates to ensure the well-being of our membership and the club's future, while at the same time creating a meaningful impact.

As we have been doing in the last two years, we continue to work on our strategic planning sessions that focus on three main areas: finance, membership and advocacy. This five-year planning and visionary exercise allows for specific tactics to be put into place in order to focus on the club's necessary actions. It also allows for more continuity as the board members go through their two-year mandates.

On October 15, the second of two CFUW Provincial Council meetings was held in St-Lambert, hosted by our sister club, the SSUWC. Members from the five Quebec clubs met to present and exchange ideas in a dynamic discussion dedicated to our current issues involving affiliation with GWI. As per the results of the vote at the CFUW AGM last June, as well as unfolding events from the August GWI Triennial meeting in Cape Town, the clubs reflected on the necessity, versus potential risks, of maintaining our connection to the international federation (GWI). The finances testify to a harsh reality but the need for the CFUW to remain part of GWI was strongly felt at the international meeting. As a result, a special task force has been implemented by the CFUW National Office to address and analyze all our options. An email from CFUW National President Karen Dunnett was sent out recently to all members. I would encourage everyone to read it and to stay up to date on the latest news on both the CFUW and GWI websites. Your Vice-President and CFUW liaison, Saôde Savary, and I will do our best to transmit important details as the story unfolds. I believe that it is important to understand the impact of GWI on women's lives both locally and internationally. Although we often feel that we have achieved some equality and made great strides here in Canada, we have to remember that this is not the case for many women elsewhere. Their need for help and support from us is still very real and we definitely ought to stand in solidarity with them. This is the reason why GWI, CFUW and the UWCM exist: to take part in the contribution to women's rights and other pertinent issues.

Let us not take for granted the especially good fortune we have living here. That being said, I look forward to engaging in further discussion and actions on this. I do wish that you will share with me your voice, concerns and ideas. I thank you all for your continued support for our club and the fight for women's rights.

# **RESOLUTIONS, ETC.**

Before its adoption, a resolution must undergo a multi-step process that involves: identification, validation, formulation, consultation and/or discussion, solution and implementation. This process is summarized in 15 activities described below.


- 1. Identify an issue of concern.
- 2. Check Policy Book that issue new.
- 3. Decide with Resolution Committee ("RC").
- 4. Complete Intent to Submit a Resolution form and send it to the National Resolution Committee ("NRC") at resolutions@cfuw.org.
- Investigate issue and set scope including data collection and analysis, challenges, objectives, jurisdictions, implications, impact and anticipated outcome – to build draft resolution ("res").
- 6. Submit draft res to the NRC for review.
- 7. NRC provides feedback and sends Proposed Draft Resolution Package to the proposing club.
- 8. Re-submit draft res based on NRC feedback.
- 9. Online distribution of proposed resolutions to sister clubs for comments and amendments.
- 10.Study and validate comments and amendments to be accepted or rejected in the final draft resolution.
- 11. Amended draft res sent to all clubs before AGM.

- 12.Presentation of final draft res by a representative of the proposing club at CFUW AGM.
- 13.Adoption or rejection of the resolution.
- 14. The adopted resolution becomes new policy and is incorporated into CFUW Policy Book.
- 15.Proposing club works with NRC to implement new policy locally and nationally.

- ◆ January 15 Submit completed draft proposed resolution
- ✦February 15 Final draft resolution sent out to National Office
- February 15 to April 15 Period when all clubs are consulted on the proposed resolutions and suggest amendments and/or comments
- ◆April 16 to May 15 Study amendments
- ♦ After May 15 Amended Draft Resolutions sent to all clubs
- ◆ June 22 to 24 Presentation during CFUW AGM
