In Quebec, we have the Quebec Provincial Council which represents the six clubs in Quebec. The Council meets twice per year, once in the spring and once in the fall; each time a member club acts as "host". The next meeting will be on **April 22nd in Quebec City.** The meeting normally gathers early for a 9:00 a.m. start and wraps up around 3:00. There is usually about a \$35.00 registration fee and a light lunch with a guest speaker is provided in addition to the business meeting. While there are designated delegates to the Council (i.e. the club presidents) any member is encouraged to come along. 
Each interest group that is active and would like to be included in the monthly newsletter must send their update to Emma by the last weekend of each month to be included in the proceeding month.

OUR PRESENTATION FOR MARCH IS THE MONTREAL RAGING GRANNIES

The Montreal Raging Grannies were started in 1989 by four activist women, Joan Hadrill who headed the peace group "West Islanders for Nuclear Disarmament", Mary Rowan, Barbara Seifred, and Jean Laidlaw Perreault. They have participated in government hearings, made presentations to community groups and marched in countless demonstrations. They are famous for "singing" out about environmental issues including nuclear waste disposal, fracking, pipelines, and plastic pollution. They have stood up for indigenous rights, women's rights, senior's rights, and equal rights. They have raged against violence and gun use and the sale of violent toys for children. Most recently, they were present at the 2022 United Nations Biodiversity Conference (COP15).

Please join us on March 15th when some of the Raging Grannies will come out to tell us about themselves and some of the issues that they are passionate about, through song.

Amal is the author of Hope is a Woman's Name, a personal memoir that recounts her experiences Dr. Amal Elsana is the Founder and Executive Director of PLEDJ (Promoting Leadership for Empowerment, Development and Justice), which brings her vision of empowering the most marginalized communities to address intractable social problems to the local, national, and international levels.

This is a compelling and important book, a reflective autobiography of an exceptional woman which must have been difficult to write. Dr Amal Elsana Alh'jooj is a Bedouin, Palestinian, Arab, Israeli, Muslim, feminist and social work academic with degrees in Social Work from Ben Gurion University of the Negev and Mcgill University. She has a wealth of experience in innovative community development in the Naquab amongst her own people, is an articulate an experienced speaker on Bedouin rights and been nominated for and received national and international awards.
