PRESIDENT'S GREETINGS

Where have the first two weeks of July gone?

Last week, Emma Major and I attended the virtual CFUW AGM, on your behalf. One of the highlights of this year's events was the introduction of a new "brand" for CFUW. It was exciting to listen to the presentation on how the process had evolved and how national input resulted in the final selection. 

June 20 was World Refugee Day

"A refugee is a person who has fled their own country because they are at risk of serious human rights violations and persecution there." (Amnesty International)

HOW DOES A PERSON BECOME A REFUGEE?

- 1. War (ex. 6.6 million from Ukraine, 13 million from Syria, 6 million from Afghanistan)
- Persecution (ex. 53.2 million risked human-rights abuses in their own countries)
- 3. Economic hardship is usually an additional factor.

RISKS REFUGEES FACE

aggression, harassment and racism - often from some of the host countries - an increase in fascist and nationalist policies in recent years, particularly in developed, rich countries migration is often exhausting, complex and onerous with risks of theft, abuse and violence (like 20,000 drowned migrants attempting to cross the Mediterranean Sea in 2020) trauma and coping challenges: more than one in five refugees have mild to moderate forms of mental illness, including post-traumatic stress disorder.

IMPACT ON WOMEN AND CHILDREN

Women represent almost half of all refugees - 60 percent of preventable maternal deaths take place during humanitarian aid - gender violence is numerous - most vulnerable are those at least one in five displaced women has experienced sexual violence - alone, pregnant, disabled, elderly.

 Almost 14 million refugee children – almost 23 million internally displaced children – victims of smugglers, treated as slaves by traffickers - over 55 percent of refugee children (compared to 90 percent, have access to primary school - gap widens to 23% for secondary school.

MANY MISCONCEPTIONS TO BE REFUTED

- Refugees come mainly to rich countries. In fact, 83 percent are welcomed in low- to middle-income countries. The six richest countries in the world only host 9 percent.
- Refugees are only the impoverished. In fact, journeying to a secure location is very expensive. Often refugees have high qualifications and a fair economic situation in their country of origin.
- 3. Refugees receive more financial help than nationals. In fact, procedures are long, complex and precarious (often unable to work or study). When immigrant status is finally granted by the host country, financial aid does not represent more than the minimum necessary to live.
- 4. Welcoming refugees has a detrimental effect on the host country's economy. In fact, immigration tends to strengthen the economic growth of developed countries, notably by supporting the activity of key sectors and significantly increasing the level of employment. Following an increase in a given migration flow, GDP per capita will increase significantly while the unemployment rate falls. Immigrants also contribute to the economy by paying taxes.

UNITED NATIONS SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS (SDGs)

- SDG 4: Quality education Refugee children suffer from major educational gaps, having only limited access to schools in their host country and facing a language barrier.
- SDG 5: Achieve gender equality Women refugees suffer even more discrimination and risk than men.
 They must not be forgotten in the struggle for gender equality.
- SDG 8: Decent work and economic growth Welcoming and integrating refugee populations has a
 positive impact on the economies of host countries, provided refugees receive the necessary
 assistance to obtain papers and find decent work.
- SDG 10: Reduced inequalities Welcoming refugees helps to reduce and even eliminate the many inequalities they face.

HOW CAN YOU HELP?

- Financially support the activities of the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR).
- Volunteer at local groups that offer help to refugees.
- Use social media to refute negative statements about refugees.
- Do the same when communicating with friends, family, colleagues.
- Offer temporary accommodation for refugees near you.
- Donate your unwanted clothing to suitable associations.
- Financially support local or international NGOs.
