A Spark, a Hunch, or an Imperative: How an Art Exhibition Happens

Gwendolyn Owens is the Director of the Visual Arts Collection at McGill University in Montreal, Quebec. This growing collection includes over 3500 works of art on view in 90 buildings and on the grounds of the University's three campuses. She was previously the Assistant Director, Curatorial Affairs, at the Canadian Centre for Architecture and Consulting Curator responsible for the Gordon Matta-Clark Archive at the institution.

Her scholarly publications include articles, exhibition catalogs, and books on a wide range of topics including artist-architect Gordon Matta-Clark, on whom she has written extensively; mid-nineteenth century American landscape painting; painters Maurice Prendergast and David Milne; artist and architect Melvin Charney; art markets in the 20 th century; and kitchen wallpaper. With Philip Ursprung, she co-edited Gordon Matta-Clark: An Archival Sourcebook (University of California Press, 2022). She is currently researching the art of Montreal artist Marian Dale Scott (1906-1993).

INTERVIEW, INSPIRE AND CONNECT

Emma Major sat down with Barbara Lewis and interviewed her over Zoom.

Barbara Lewis has known she would be a singer since she was seven years old. She is classically trained and has a background as an opera singer in Canada and the US, and she traveled and sang in Europe. Throughout her career as a performer, she was inspired to write her own music so she could sing the message she wanted to. Giving a voice to her emotions, and talent. She has released several CDs throughout her career, illustrating her growth as a human. Her discography outlines what has impacted and inspired her life choices and challenges as a singer.

Barbara has taught singing and music as an extension of her inspiration. She dedicated her life to fortifying and challenging others to learn how to stand, breathe, be confident, and challenge their own limitations. Teaching was at the forefront of her music career during the pandemic, specializing in students in their 40s. Lewis commented on being continuously inspired by her students who displayed a drive to channel the depths of their emotions through singing. When asked to describe singing as an art form Barbara mentioned that she truly believes that singing impacts all aspects of one's life. For example, learning how to sing can help with breathing better; learning how to inhale and control one's breath. She encourages a self-reliant level of confidence, and expression through vulnerability. People who sing tend to be happier and Barbara loves to watch her students grow from their lessons and develop their emotional and physical limitations through expression.

Over the pandemic, Barbara pursued lessons herself and was inspired to challenge herself to learn more and push her vocal range. Her goal is to constantly try different things and she decided to change her vocal range. She re-trained her muscles and strengths to develop a new sound. In doing so, her voice now has the ability to display more shades of feelings; almost like a spectrum of color for emotions that display a storyline in her performance.

Barabra's goal for her Cabaret is to showcase her range, and her ability to emote. Displaying her strength in painting a beautiful story of inspiration and lessons. She describes the show as a collection of songs that display love, laughter, nature, and time. When asked, Barbara described the main thread of her show as an introduction to her newfound power and the importance of nature in our lives. On stage she loves to showcase her vulnerability and interact with the audience as a friend with an informal energy, this concert will introduce a fun and friendly side of the very talented Barabara Lewis.

Barbara is constantly inspired by pop and classical performers who celebrate the message of "This is how I feel, how do you feel?". During the interview, when asked what performers inspired her she referenced Brandi Carlile's rendition of Shine originally performed by Joni Mitchell, Maureen Forrester's dichotomy of performances, and of course our very own Montreal's Leonard Cohen.

When Barbara was deciding what songs to perform during her Cabaret she mentioned that she was inspired by gardens and how flowers have been created. If she could sum up your sound into a plant it would be either peonies, with their soft and velvet feeling full of emotions, or orchids for their exotic nuance.

Her advice to a younger self is to have patience. She felt she knew it would take a long time to get to where she wanted to be and at the level range she wanted to develop into for her singing. Barbara would advise herself to be patient for the version of a performer and singer she knew she would be. This show was created to celebrate what she can still do at 70 and how she can inspire others to dream without the limitations of age and embrace a full-hearted and big spirit.

Interesting News and Findings from a Member

On March 23, 2023, the Minister of Health (the "Minister") introduced Bill 15, an Act to make the health and social services system more efficient (the "Bill"). As described in our previous bulletin, "<u>Bill 15: The</u> <u>Quebec Government Wants to Limit the Specific Medical</u> <u>Necessity Measure</u>", an essential aspect of this legislation modifies the specific medical necessity measure by introducing additional conditions of patient eligibility. Parliamentary work on the Bill resumed on August 21 when the Minister introduced 150 amendments. This bulletin focuses on the amendments proposed regarding the specific medical necessity measure.
